New England RV Trip Friday, July 31 thru Thursday, October 29, 2009

Day 1 - Friday, July 31, 2009

Day 8 - Friday, August 7, 2009

Today, after the rain stopped, around noon, we drove to Chadds Ford, PA. Del visited the Brandywine Art Museum. The museum features mostly Wyeth art and Del enjoyed it very much. Jerry took a tour of the Brandywine battle ground. We did not know the significance of this battle until now. Even though General Washing and his troops had to retreat, the battle showed the Americans could take on the more organized British troops and make a good showing. Day 11 - Monday, August 10, 2009

There is a shuttle bus (\$2.00/round trip per person) from the aquarium to the city, which is a very good deal considering the concerns and cost of parking in the city. Parking at the aquarium was only \$10.00 for the day. So for \$14.00 we parked all day and had transportation to and from the city. What a time we had. It was very ho (near 95 degrees), but we were able to duck into air conditioned building several times, which made the heat less oppressive. We saw the Liberty Bell, with no waiting. It gives one pause to think about the significance of the bell. It was this bell which rang to announce the approval of the Declaration Of Independence. We also visited Independence Hall, where the Declaration of Independence was approved and later the US Constitution. What a feeling to be in the same room where it all began and to realize the risk all the signers faced for signing the Declaration. We also went to Betsy Ross's home (Jerry was not impressed). We also found the US Second Bank which contains a virtual treasure of original oil paintings and sculptures of many of the "Movers & Shakers" of the independence movement. If you have not yet visited Philly, we certainly recommend it highly.

Day 12 - Tuesday, August 11, 2009

We are still camped near Philadelphia. Today we again drove to Camden to Adventure Aquarium. We parked there and took the shuttle bus to Philly. Twice each day during low tide and again at high tide the river reverses itself over the "Reversing Falls" we had dinner in the Falls restaurant overlooking the river and falls..

Day 44 - Saturday, September 12 2009

Today we visited the City Market in St John. This market was built specifically as a public market around 1875. Some very nice fruits and vegetables and many other interesting items for sale. We had lunch at an interesting small eatery in the market. After lunch we visited New Brunswick Museum. This museum features historical, geological, and art facet5s of life in New Brunswick province. After the museum we returned to the "Reversing Falls' and saw the rive/tide during high tide, which was GREAT because when we visited the falls on Friday it was during low tide. To appreciate the falls, one must visit during both high and low tides. If you can also see this during "Slack Tide" all the better. We were able to see all tree.

Day 45- Sunday, September 13, 2009

Today we visited took the ferry from St John to Digby on Nova Scotia. Our friend John & Gail had recommended the Dockside Suites and we were able to make reservations. What a wonderful location, right on Funday Bay. From our back door balcony we can see across part of the bay. THANX, john & Gail. What a view - - wish you were here. We took a walk around town. Day 46 - Monday, September14, 2009

So we turned around and returned to Digby. We did travel though a very remote area with few houses. We got back to the Timberland Acres RV park, where had put or rig in temp storage and got set up for the night

Day 50- Friday, September 18 2009

They now have a fantastic lodge and resort in Stowe. The family was the basis for the movie "The Sound Of Music". On the way back to the campground we stopped in at the Ben & Jerry Ice Cream factory. We went on the factory tour (and got a couple of free samples). The Ben & Jerry story is a true American dream come true. They also make some GREAT ice cream.

Day 60 - Monday, September 28 2009

Today was still overcast and dizzily. We visited the Vermont Teddy Bear Company. What a collection of teddy bears they have. We passed on the factory tour, but did enjoy the showroom. After the VTB company we visited the Morgan Horse museum. The Morgan horse was the only breed created in the US and the Morgans were the best in all categories, including stamina. There were also the fastest. They were used extensively in the calvaries of both sides. Unfortunately the museum was not open on Mondays, but we did get a wealth of information from the attendant. On the way home we stopped in at the Cedar Hollow Cider Mill and learned a bit about how to make apple cider.
